- How did the camp's Shabbat and Havdalah celebrations affect Sami?
- What did you learn from the Shabbat story Rabbi
 Joe told the campers? Do you agree that being with others makes life sweeter?
- How did music help Sami at camp?
- Why did Sami and Gabby become close friends?
 How did Gabby's speech issue and Sami's worries about sleepaway camp affect their friendship?
- Why did their grandma choose to take a Yiddish class with Daniel and Sami?

- How did his time at camp change Daniel? Do you think their time at camp will affect the relationship between the two cousins?
- Are you a "sleepaway camp kind of kid?"
